Bindoon and District Historical Society

Who are the Bindoon and District Historical Society?

The Bindoon & District Historical Society manages and operates the Bindoon Museum which is located at the Brockman Centre, a Heritage Precinct, which includes a Pottery shed, Arts and Craft centre and Men's Shed.

The museum is run by local volunteers and is open to the public Wednesday, Saturday, Sunday, Public Holidays and for special tour groups on request.

Committee meetings are held generally on the second Tuesday each month at 2pm and visitors are welcome to attend and have a cuppa.

The Society's main focus is on the preservation of local historical artifacts which has an important role not only as an educational institution but also as a cultural awareness.

The museum represents a major social investment within the community. The preservation of YOUR HERITAGE is vitally important.

Our annual Historic Vehicle Day, which is held in September each year attracts significant numbers of visitors to the district and showcases the Chittering community.

Wannamal Community Centre

Who are the Wannamal Community Centre?

Our hall, tennis courts, Bushfire Brigade Shed are located 26kms from the Great Northern Hwy turnoff on Bindoon Moora Rd, opposite the much-used Robert Hindmarsh Rest Area. The bush areas around these facilities are well known for their splendid display of wildflowers during Springtime.

We are very proud Wannamaliens and have a long history, with records dating back to 1910.

Our facilities are managed by a Management Committee comprising 13+, made up of members of tennis and community people as well and Shire Councilors. We meet by-monthly. Our facilities provide a hub for all things sporting and social for the Wannamal district. Over the years past we have promoted several different sports, such as Indoor Bowls, Indoor Cricket, and Indoor Netball.

As well as tennis, which runs from late October to the end of March, we now offer Badminton one evening a week, during the tennis off season. Once upon a time we managed our own maintenance but now are very grateful to the Shire who pick up this tab.

The hall facilities are also used by Koorunga CWA Branch, visiting caravan clubs, Scout and School groups, Wannamal Lake Catchment Group and farm orientated workshops. It is also available for private hire. The hall has a 200 people capacity and offers a well-equipped kitchen, crockery, cutlery, tables, chairs and barbecue. Attached to the hall is an enclosed patio area. We do our best to meet socially and advertise these events on Facebook and through the local paper. A Christmas Tree event is held annually with a meal provided together with the usual children delights and entertainment. Our main claim to fame is the Long Table Dinner held to celebrate Australia Day. This event is not held on the 26th January but soon after. It is an evening under the stars on the oval area. Ticket numbers are capped and keenly sought after.

We call for volunteer when needed. These activities are usually tidy up busy bees and weed pulls in the surrounds of the rest area. Our local Bushfire Brigade does rely on volunteers as well.

Who are the Chittering Scout Group?

The Chittering Scout group is made up of a group of local volunteers that get together once a week to provide scouting and outdoor adventure activities for children of the local community. What volunteering opportunities exist within the Chittering Fire Services?



If you're not interested in fighting fires but are interested in operations, join our Incident Support Brigade. This brigade supports the incident management team and crews in operations, welfare, communications, recruitment and administration of an incident.

The Shire of Chittering strongly supports the recruitment of both male and female volunteers representing a wide diversity of ages, cultural and ethnic backgrounds. Volunteering is a great way to meet new people that are prepared to share their knowledge on fire behaviour and become more familiar with the surroundings in your area.

Bindoon Arts and Crafts

Who are the Bindoon Arts and Crafts?

Bindoon Arts and Crafts are all about coffee, talking, sewing, crafts, embroidery, cross stitch, crocheting/knitting, mosaicking, weaving, pottery, and ceramics.

We provide community outreach & inclusion, enhancing quality of people's lives, personal enjoyment and achievement, intellectual stimulation, forming community connections. The group bridges age gaps, opens up people's mindsets, reduces isolation & loneliness, builds social skills, self-worth, and social networks decreases stress, improves mental agility improves gross & fine motor skills and decreases cognitive declines in the aged / disabled.

Examples of the projects we undertake are:

Reclaim the Void:

- Weaving and repurposing old sheets and donating to reclaim the void and art installation to help the Ngalia elders in Leonora WA. The idea is to symbolically "seal" one of the holes with made by mining with a large-scale dot painting woven from discarded fabrics. We are hosting weaving workshops through out the year for this and have had a great response.
- Children's Christmas craft workshop during the school holidays Monday 13th Dec we will be hosting local children to make Christmas ornament's
- Supporting Dandelion's WA Making Library bags and pencil cases for up to 4500 children to be able to start school with a bag of new supplies.

Many roles exist from just being a Member on the committee to Co-Ordinator, Treasurer, secretary, Marketing, shop co-ordinator, shop duties, EFPOS operations, stock rotation, mentoring, disabled, youth, aged.

Chittering Wildlife Carers

Who are the Chittering Wildlife Carers?

The Chittering Wildlife Carers have been providing voluntary rescue, rehabilitation and release of sick and injured native animals in Chittering and surrounding areas for more than 35 years.

- We rescue, rehabilitate and release native fauna
- We remove and relocate reptiles for local residents
- We provide educational information for the community around sick and injured wildlife in the local newspaper, at community events, in schools and community groups and on our social media pages.

In the past year our group has rescued more than 580 animals including: 151 kangaroos, 1 emu, 15 possums and echidnas, 44 reptiles including bats, turtles, snakes and lizards and 369 birds!

- People can apply to become a wildlife carer with our group by attending induction training and then applying to be a carer.
- Wildlife rescue and taxi for animals from vets to carers etc.
